

DEAN'S LETTER

Dear Beloved Friends in Christ,

"Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. See, I am doing a new thing!" (Isaiah 43:18-19).

As I reflect on the past year at Christ Church Cathedral, I see God's hand moving among us in powerful ways. Lives are being changed. Worship is deepening. Community is growing. Service is expanding.

We are not the same Cathedral we were a year ago—because that is the nature of the Gospel. It transforms.

Worship: At the Heart of Who We Are

At the very core of our life together is worship. And what a year of worship it has been!

Our Christmas Eve and Christmas Day services saw the largest attendance in years:

December 24th in-person attendance

```
1 PM - ~600 people
```

4 PM – \sim 750 people (with \sim 200 turned away!)

8 PM - \sim 850 people (again, another \sim 200 turned away!)

11 PM − ~700 people

December 25th

289 in-person and 225 on-line

That's thousands coming to celebrate the birth of Christ—so many that we are already exploring ways to make more room next year, perhaps with outdoor speakers or video.

But our worship extends far beyond Christmas. Every single week, people gather in this sacred space to meet God.

Sunday Worship

8 AM Eucharist – 1,557 people over the year (avg. 28.8 per week)

10:30 AM Eucharist – 11,783 people in person (avg. 236 per week), plus 6,535 online (avg. 133.4 per week). Total 10:30 AM Sunday Attendance (in-person & online): 269 per week. St. Brigid's (1:30 PM) – avg. 18 in person, 42 online: 60 per week. Compline – avg. 54 in person, 44 online: 99 per week.

Midweek Worship

Thursday 7:30 AM Eucharist – 691 people over the year (avg. 15 per week). Weekday 12:15 PM Eucharist – 1,988 people over the year (avg. 8.4 per day).

These numbers are not just statistics. Each person represents a story, a life, a faith journey. Every time we gather—whether it's a grand festival service or a quiet weekday Eucharist—we are participating in God's transforming work.

And we see that transformation in the growing number of baptisms:

Six baptisms in November Nine baptisms at the Baptism of the Lord in January Six more already scheduled for the Easter Vigil

We continue to see high numbers of weddings, baptisms, and new members joining the Cathedral. These are all signs of vitality and growth—signs of a community where people are encountering Christ.

Service: The Gospel in Action

But worship does not stop at the church doors. True worship leads to service—and at Christ Church Cathedral, service is at the heart of who we are.

This past year, **our Maundy Café served 12,191 meals to some of the most vulnerable people in our city.** That is 12,191 times that someone was met with hospitality, dignity, and nourishment—both physical and spiritual.

At the same time, our Cathedral continues to be a place of refuge. Refugees, those experiencing homelessness, people struggling with addiction, and others on the margins continue to find their way to our doors. We welcome them not just as guests, but as Christ himself.

And the need is only growing:

The drug overdose crisis continues to take lives at an alarming rate—192 deaths in March alone, or **6.2 people per day dying of overdose in British Columbia**.

The housing crisis remains dire—Vancouver is now 92nd out of 94 global cities for affordability, with home prices 12.3 times higher than median household income.

These are not just statistics. These are people—our neighbours, our siblings in Christ. And the call of Jesus is clear: love your neighbour. Feed the hungry. Shelter the homeless. Proclaim release to the captives.

This is why we serve. Because our faith is not just about what happens in the pews on Sunday—it's about what happens on the streets, in the shelters, in the hospitals, in the margins.

Transformation: The Spirit Moving Among Us

Through worship and service, God is transforming us—individually and as a community.

We see this in our music ministry, which has been revitalized under Dr. Neil Cockburn's leadership. Our Sundays at 4 series—Choral Evensong, Holden Evening Prayer, Taizé, and Broadway Vespers—will continue to offer diverse and deeply moving worship experiences.

We see it in my strategic priorities, which I see as important in shaping the future of our Cathedral:

Proclaiming and Embodying the Good News
 Creating worship that reflects Vancouver's diversity.
 Partnering with groups like the BCR reservists for chaplaincy and outreach.
 Expanding our digital ministry to engage more people.

2. Fostering Transformational Community

Raising up new leaders from underrepresented voices.

Offering baptism preparation, Bible studies, and courses on reconciliation and justice.

Advocating for housing, mental health, and addiction recovery.

3. Caring for Creation and Building a Sustainable Future

Making our Cathedral operations more sustainable.

Partnering with Indigenous communities on climate justice.

Offering education on environmental stewardship and nonviolence.

This is who we are called to be. A church that worships deeply, serves boldly, and allows the Holy Spirit to transform us into the hands and feet of Christ in the world.

"Behold, I am making all things new." (Revelation 21:5)

That's the promise. That's the invitation. That's what we are witnessing at Christ Church Cathedral.

Worship that brings people into the presence of God. Service that extends Christ's love to those in need. Transformation that changes lives, both within and beyond our walls.

As we step into this new year, we do so with hope, with faith, and with the joyful anticipation of all that God has yet to do among us.

Thank you for being part of this journey. Thank you for your faith, your presence, your commitment to this Cathedral community.

May God bless you abundantly in the year ahead.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The 2024 Parish Council consisted of the Trustees: The Very Rev. Christopher A. Pappas, Michael Law, Holly McMillin, Mark Halyk, Irene Pang, Douglas Yee and Gordon Matheson; the Treasurer Terrence Clark, the Secretary Jennifer Barr; and the licensed and covenanted clergy of the parish: the Rev. Areeta Bridgemohan, the Rev. Clare Morgan, the Rev. Juanita Clark, the Rev. Kevin de la Mare, the Rev. Christian Okeke, the Rev. Matthew Senf, the Rev. Stuart Mennigke; and the at-large members Penny Zhou, Matthew Nichiporuk, Byron Jang, Barbara Brown, and Anne Fletcher.

The 2024 Parish Council met for approximately 3.5 hours each on June 1, 2024, September 7, 2024 and January 18, 2025.

The Parish Council business focused on receiving and discussing clergy ministry updates and getting updates from and planning for parish ministries and on community events. Topics discussed included the CATS Ministry, the Stewardship Committee, various Formation Activities, the Children & Families Ministry, the Music Director Search, Pastoral Care Ministries, 135 Anniversary activities (picnic, play, hymn sing, final gala), Cathedral Arts Ministries, Remembrance Sunday weekend events, Digital and Creative Ministries, and an extensive look at current and future plans in the Cathedral Music Ministries and at Rupert's farewell.

CLERGY & STAFF REPORTS

The Rev. Areeta Bridgemohan, Vicar

My guiding mantra this year has been: "Make room for the Holy Spirit." This past year has been a year of building and laying foundations.

Pastoral care

Our lay pastoral care team has been growing in numbers and in relationship with one another. Last February, I led a full-day training on pastoral care with support from the Diocese to launch our home visiting ministry. We currently have 13 members of this pastoral care team, conducting about 8 visits a month¹. We conduct both home communion visits and visits that don't involve communion at parishioners' homes and care institutions all over the Greater Vancouver area. I am blessed to work with a group of such caring and faithful people. As we continue to build our pastoral care systems, I am working on having regular contact with parishioners on meaningful anniversaries, like weddings, baptisms, and funerals. We have three members who have offered to write cards and call. As our clergy team has significantly changed, I look forward to continuing to strengthen our clergy team's role and coordination of pastoral care.

Formation

Pre-marital and baptismal preparation

Rev. Clare and I led a 3-session premarital preparation offering for 3 couples preparing for marriage at the Cathedral. There were several gifts as a result of this offering: couples saved a significant amount of money, couples got connected to one another, and Rev. Clare and I had fun (hopefully the couples did too!). We are planning on leading another 3-session series for 3 couples this Spring.

I am grateful to have handed off the baptismal preparation process to two of my colleagues: Senior Curate, Rev. Christian Okeke and our deacon, Rev. Kevin de la Mare. Rev. Christian meets with the inquirers and Rev. Kevin prepares them to receive the sacrament and learn about the liturgy. We have had 15 baptisms since Jan 2024 (including that of my youngest son!). It is a privilege for us to welcome new members to the body of Christ and a sign of hope for the church at large.

¹ Safe church guidelines require 2 adults per visit in a private home setting.

Sunday forums and mid-week formation²

Upon Rev. Alisdair's departure last September, there were a few formation groups that needed new leadership. As a clergy team, we discerned that Wondering Wednesdays would end upon Alisdair's departure. The new leadership of the 40-minute forums includes Irene Pang, John Wade and myself. I have greatly enjoyed the process of planning, reflecting and discernment involved in the forum schedule. We have hosted very well attended forums. Since last September, we have hosted 10 forums, with an average attendance of 44 people. In December, we experimented with a forum after the 10:30am service, with lunch to learn about the history of music at the Cathedral to mark Rupert's retirement. We are considering offering more forums following the 10:30am service, to engage a broader spectrum of our congregation.

In the spring of last year, Claude St-Denis began to offer regular Tuesday evening scripture reflection. Bible study is a mainstay of a church's formation and there is no end to the richness of studying the sacred texts! We used that same evening online timeslot to trial an introductory theology 8-session series, which was regularly attended by about 14 people.

In January this year, we launched Anglican 101, with 8 sessions online with 2 in person meetings. We invited our sister Cathedral in Whitehorse to attend, as well as folks from all over the Diocese. We have had a wonderful response - with 50 registrants. Each session is led by different presenters, including clergy from around the Diocese. One fun spin-off of this program is that following an expression of interest by some youth, Rev. Jessica Schaap (Synod office) and Rev. Alecia Greenfield (St. Anselm's) will be offering confirmation preparation.

Children and family ministry

At the beginning of last year, after Lauren's (our former Dir of CYF) departure, I gathered a small team to guide our decision making and discernment in this time of transition in this ministry area. I am strongly committed to children and family ministry, and am still asking for the Spirit's guidance for a vision of that ministry here at the Cathedral.

² I prefer to use the word 'formation' rather than education. To me, formation refers to a broader process of planting seeds in our hearts, our minds and our souls in our journey of transformation into Christ's likeness.

Jennifer Hiebert and Tasia Pappas have been wonderful companions in this in-between time. We hosted a meeting for parents and children at the beginning of the year to hear their desires for this ministry. We have held off on hiring a minister in this role, as there are a number of unknowns with regard to budget, my capacity and the vision of the ministry. I feel we are now in a position to hire a part-time children's ministry assistant. We need to build the program and offer some consistent formation. I would like this assistant to offer primarily Godly Play for our children aged 3-10 years of age. I would also like this assistant to regularly offer service opportunities during our service time or following worship, to expand children's formation to include service to those in need.

Retreats

One area of ministry that I am excited to practice more is designing retreats. I will be leading a retreat for Healing Prayer, Healing Touch and our Pastoral Care teams in February. The Cathedral has also booked the entire Rivendell Retreat Centre for the last weekend in June.

I'm grateful for the opportunity to be in ministry at Christ Church with you all and look forward to continuing to journey deeper in faith. May God continue to bless our ministry.

The Rev. Kevin de la Mare, Deacon for Diversity

As a vocational deacon (if you don't know what that is, please ask me) my work is carried out both inside the church and out in the world. My work in the world is carried out as a risk manager at the Vancity credit union. I love working for an organization which remains firm in its commitment to social and environmental progress supporting initiatives related to climate action, reconciliation, financial inclusion, affordable housing, equity, and anti-racism. Thus, I am able to live out my diaconal vocation in a concrete way within the economic and business environment.

Within the church I have liturgical and other responsibilities. It is a blessing to serve at the eucharist on Sundays leading the creed and confession, preparing the altar for communion and, very importantly, dismissing us all to go back out into the world to love and serve the Lord. I have covenanted to preach approximately once every

quarter, and try, as your deacon, to maintain a focus on the church's mission in the world.

In September I was asked to assist in the preparation of candidates for baptism. Baptism preparation sessions were held in September and November 2024, and again in January 2025. The largest group was the January session; 19 people attended in preparation for the 9 candidates baptized on January 12, 2025. Baptism preparation consists of a preliminary meeting with Father Christian and two preparation sessions which I lead in the weeks just prior to the baptism.

I was also invited to become a member of the leadership (known as the "squad") for the men's breakfast. I have enjoyed getting to know the leadership as well as the many men who attend. Conversations are always very stimulating.

I have continued in my role as chaplain to the Dean's Council for Diversity and Multiculturalism and begun my role as chaplain to the Stewardship Committee.

I am deeply grateful to serve in this community and have been blessed by your encouragement and support.

I give thanks to God for you all.

The Rev. Clare Morgan, Pastor to St. Brigid's & Associate for Digital Ministry

In January of 2024 I took on a new role at the Cathedral: that of digital minister, assuming responsibility for our social media, as well as trying to build an online and digital community.

After consulting with the outgoing comms director Alicia and Ben Dobyns (pianist to St. Brigid's and all-around digital/online expert), I followed their advice to focus primarily on creating content for Instagram, while having Facebook (a platform where most of our engagement was driven by long term members of the Cathedral) function almost as an "internal bulletin board." I also created a Cathedral TikTok and made some content for that, and engaged with Threads. Some of my initiatives were weekly illustrated prayers, live streamed Daily Office rites (Evening Prayer and "Prayers in the Loft" at 11am on Wednesdays), smaller campaigns of shared images

and quotes geared toward particular seasons such as the Season of Creation and Advent, ICYMI ("In Case You Missed It") short clips of the previous Sunday's sermon, carousels (collections of photos) from Sunday mornings, and #todayssermoninone, where I would try to distill the Sunday sermon to one quote or thought (shared on Threads). I also made both a Holy Week and Advent video series. The former featured members of our clergy team talking about the special liturgical offerings given throughout the week as well as brief explanations. In Advent I offered a series primarily on YouTube called "Cradle Songs," which featured several people from our community and the diocese sharing carols that had special meaning to them, and then singing them together in front of the Woodwards creche set.

One of the other projects of the year, spearheaded by Ben Dobyns, was the creation of a Discord server, which we called SQUID (Super Queer Union of Inclusive Devotion), a gathering place for people affiliated with affirming churches across the Pacific Northwest. With the establishment of this group came two new community offerings: Sanctuary D&D and Drag Communion. Sanctuary D&D is a Dungeons and Dragons campaign held in both Christ Church Cathedral and Shaughnessy Heights United Church, led by Ben and other community members, which has seen phenomenal success and built new friendships and connections beyond the walls of our shared churches. Drag Communion is a liturgical offering first held at Shaughnessy Heights United Church in partnership with ministry leads there, and featured a communion service hosted by local drag queens, including the Cathedral's own Byron Hanson in a debut role as Bona Seraphina. The pilot event, held in October, packed Shaughnessy Heights Church and the livestream of that service boasts one of their highest view rates, with people tuning in from all across North America and then immediately getting started on their own versions of the rite. We plan to host another event, incorporating feedback from that pilot program, in Eastertide, still at Shaughnessy Heights United Church. All will be welcome.

In June I used my study leave to travel to Turkey with Illuminated Tours, an organization founded by my friend and teacher Omid Safi (a professor of Islamic Studies at Duke University), where my husband and I immersed ourselves in the life and history of the region, engaged in interfaith dialogue with new Muslim friends, and were privileged to learn from prominent Sufi teachers, including Esin Chelebi (direct descendant of Mevlana Rumi), and Cemalnoor Sargut.

My work as "priorix" with Sanctuary of the Arts (an online contemplative arts-based community hosted by St. Hildegard's Sanctuary) continued, and I participated and helped with a variety of workshops. In addition, I produced a couple of podcast episodes before the "abbess" (the Rev. Melanie Calabrigo) and I found ourselves at the point where we needed to take a break and regroup. We are getting ready to explore what new offerings we may be able to provide in 2025.

Alongside all of these things I have continued to walk beside St. Brigid's, the Sunday afternoon congregation, which began meeting for fellowship and games more frequently after tentative re-calibration throughout this strange post- (but not really) pandemic era. A highlight was the Shrove Tuesday pancake supper, hosted by members of St. Brigid's, which featured a delicious repast provided by the inimitable Mark Halyk and others, and conversation. I also continued to provide chaplaincy to the Morning Prayer on Zoom group, the Tuesday evening Centering Prayer group, and the Labyrinth guild, including opening the year as musical guest alongside my dear friends Eda Ertan and Masa Kateb (and partnering with them for a beautiful interfaith labyrinth walk in April called "Connecting Hearts" which featured music and prayers from Rabbi Laura Duhan-Kaplan and her husband Charles, and Bishop John Stephens).

Finally, I was very happy to once again offer Teilhard de Chardin's "Mass on the World" and "Songs for the Road to the Cross", both in Holy Week.

Special thanks and endless gratitude to Ben Dobyns, the St. Brigid's discernment group, our lay staff, and my clergy colleagues for their kindness, patience, advocacy, and resiliency during a challenging year of change in this place. With prayers that God's will of love may be revealed more and more as we all journey together.

- I continue to deployed by the Dean to special services and will meet with a family to plan an upcoming funeral today

Kathy Irwin, Director of Operations

2024 marked my return to the Cathedral and I was delighted to see so many familiar faces, and meeting some "new to me" faces as well! This community has grown and deepened in wonderful ways since 2020.

A large part of my role is to support our operations team. I directly support the Maundy Café, Building Operations, Events, Finance & Administration. This means filling in for staff when they are on vacation, empowering and coaching members of our team, and being a resource, support and a sounding board, as well as drafting operational policy.

Each member of our team supports ministries at the Cathedral in different ways. Two examples of how I was able to support ministries in 2024 include: providing behind the scenes support for the CATS Anglican Foundation grant and providing supporting information for the Stewardship Committee's annual campaign.

I am also delegated to administer Screening in Faith within our parish. We have made good strides to ensure that all of our staff and volunteers within the targeted ministries have police records checks and the necessary Creating a Safe Church Environment courses.

It's a pleasure to be in service alongside you during this exciting time in the history of the Cathedral. Thank you to all of our wonderful volunteers and donors who make this all possible.

Lane Wyness, Maundy Café Manager

It is all about the volunteers, GVFB and donations from the parishioners in 2024.

The GVFB has been a great donor to the Maundy Cafe in 2024, providing approximately 16,040 lbs in food donations (estimated cost of \$57,423.20) and a \$2,000 grant. Maundy Café would look alot different without this donation, which goes a long way to help to keep our costs to approximately \$2.69 per meal.

Fifty volunteers selflessly gave of their time to serve 16,620 meals made with care to "nourish the body" in 2024 (3 days a week for 10 months). Meals were served with a friendly smile, a kind word, and a listening ear, all with live music from hymns, show tunes, ABBA and yes, even Led Zeppelin played on the piano.

Three times a week our clients are seen and heard in a society that would often overlook and pass them by, so the volunteers also provide "nourishment for the

soul" to our clients. With this "good" our volunteers provide, they have created different communities: amongst our clients themselves, between our clients and the volunteers, and amongst the volunteers themselves, often creating a "family kinship".

They care for one another.

This is a recipe from the heart that I am sure will continue into 2025.

Diogo Portela, Administrative Assistant to the Dean

Last year, I introduced several improvements that streamlined workflows and enhanced efficiency in our church operations. One major initiative was implementing Trello to track workflows, improving organization and collaboration, especially in weddings and funerals.

With the support of Ben Dobyns, who set up InDesign as our primary tool for bulletin creation, I optimized the creation process, cutting production time in half. This transition not only made bulletin design more efficient but also contributed to a significant reduction in paper use by shortening its length and incorporating digital alternatives to limit printing.

Additionally, I played a key role in strengthening our reception team by interviewing and selecting new volunteers. The newly selected volunteers — along with our long-time ones — helped ensure that the reception desk was consistently staffed, providing front-line support by answering phone calls, responding to emails, and assisting visitors whenever possible. This solved an issue that was a source of continuous complaints from the congregation before I started working at the cathedral.

In collaboration with the clergy and the Director of Operations, Kathy Irwin, and with valuable input from the many members of the congregation, I refined the Chronicle newsletter submission process, making it more structured and efficient. As a result of these collective efforts, the newsletter and some parts of the website were updated and/or reformatted, improving readability and engagement to better serve our community.

Vanessa Ho, Senior Finance Administrator

2024 presented significant financial challenges. The Cathedral could not balance the budget. To address this shortfall was a priority, so a stewardship committee stepped in during the year. Thanks to her leadership, Jane Osler and her team provided strategic oversight and guidance. After many weeks of focusing on the drive for the "Deficit Challenge and the 13th-month Gifts", the response from the generosity of our donors has been a cornerstone of support during the last year, enabling us to maintain critical operations despite financial constraints. Together, we were making a lasting impact.

Amid these challenges, we were delighted to welcome back our new Director of Operations, Kathy Irwin. Her wealth of experience at the Cathedral and leadership skills, coupled with her sense of humor, have already had a positive impact on our team and operations. Her presence brings renewed energy and confidence as we navigate these financial hurdles.

Special thanks go to our new Treasurer, Terrence Clark, whose fresh perspective and dedication have been invaluable in updating the Cathedral's financial position to the Trustees. I also want to extend our heartfelt gratitude to our past Treasurer, Ian Birtwell, for his continuous community involvement and support.

Finally, thank you to our incredible volunteers and generous donors! Your support and dedication make all the difference. We couldn't do it without you!

Jeremy Smith, Events Coordinator

It has been wonderful to welcome a wide variety of musical acts to Christ Church Cathedral, from choirs and electronic ambient artists, to jazz groups. It was fantastic to be a part of both Early Music Vancouver's annual Summer Festival for another year, and the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra's Day of Music. We were also lucky enough to have had some filming at the Cathedral this past year which is always exciting!

Shawn Warmington, Building Manager

The building department hired two casual custodians this past year to add flexibility and coverage as needed—welcome to the team Jack and Joseph! Primarily they have helped cover the Maundy Café and concert shifts, though there have been opportunities in opening and closing the building, and for support shifts during

memorials, weddings, and other events.

Due to the winter of 2023 feeling colder inside than usual, there was some concern for our heating system. Thanks to a dedicated team effort and the contractors we rely on regularly, we've been able to restore reliability to our building, and there is a framework in place as to what direction we could move towards when there is a decision to replace the current system. Information has also been gathered over the year for longstanding projects that we aim to see fulfilled, which will restore interior and exterior spaces.

The biggest project of note was the installation of a new cooling tower. Otherwise, 2024 has been a year dedicated mainly to upkeep and cleanliness—we are aiming to keep our standards high as there has been an increase in events at the Cathedral. Work has begun in the women's washroom to update the space, and this summer will see the usual return of outside efforts to upkeep our wooden benches. Christmas at the Cathedral had a higher turnout from previous years and that is in itself a reason to celebrate.

MINISTRY REPORTS

Justice Education and Advocacy Ministry (JEAM)

In 2024, JEAM continued its focus on fundraising and collecting donated household items to support Shiba's family, the Mohammadis from Afghanistan: Mom, Dad, 7 children and youths, now aged 8 to 27 years of age. A subcommittee, Rescue Shiba's Family (RSF) support group, assumed this work. The family, within months of their arrival, enrolled in ESL classes (the LINC Language Instruction for Newcomers to Canada program) and continue to take courses most evenings and on the weekend, to advance their education and integrate more easily.

By December 30, 2023, \$44,846.34 or 75 % of our goal had been raised and the family had a fully furnished house and kitchen. Parishioners in 2023 donated new pots and pans and cutlery sets and found friends about to move who donated tables, chairs, dressers, vacuum cleaners, bicycles, fabric and numerous other material goods that delighted the family and made them feel so welcome in this country. Chris Ellison donated his moving truck and crew to deliver a heavy glass-topped dining room table; both Marvin Westwood, retired Rev. Andrew Pike, David Kellett, Neale Adams and Ros Kellett donated their time and vehicles to move donated items from the storage garage in the home of Margery Kellett out to Maple Ridge.

On February 24 Saturday the Mohammadi family treated four of us from the Rescue Shiba Family group (Shannon, Neale, Ros, the Rev. Kathleen Schmitt) to a sumptuous dinner and we sat on carpeted mattresses on the floor, Afghan style!

Over the year 2024, Shannon Muir and the REST Regional Ecumenical Sponsorship Team provided Dad Mohammed with an industrial sewing machine and he started furniture cover repair projects. The RSF donated several sewing machines and mother and daughter started sewing tunics, shirts, dresses and cloaks. All continue attending local educational institutions and learning English, and the older ones are pursuing career education. In December Dad Mohammed passed his written driver's test, following-his three older daughters who passed their tests in the previous month! They share a car on loan to them from a Canadian Afghan friend. Further fundraising efforts were undertaken. Bill Orr & Ros Kellett sent out direct Appeal letters to potential donors both within the congregation and beyond to our

other networks of friends. A new pamphlet was created by Neale and Shiba to emphasize the family's needs for ongoing funds. The Rev. Margaret Marquardt organized a May 25 BBQ picnic to raise funds and build community between the 10 family members here in Canada and parishioners. This was a huge success, helping us-raise more needed funds (over \$1000 raised) and giving more social support to the family. Mark Halyk was instrumental with his Safe Foods Handling certificate and knowledge of how to use the outdoor burners!

By June 15, 2024 the family were financially self-sufficient, a great success for the cathedral and them, all within the one year of sponsorship. The eldest son, Nawab, and third daughter, Hawa, a gradually gained full time employment at Royal City Upholstery in Surrey over the summer of 2024. Second daughter Latifa was hired by the local Canadian tire store for part time work, mostly on the weekends.

Under the Memorandum of Understanding of August 2022 we promised to raise 56,425.00 and to support the family and their basic needs for 12 months, ending June 15, 2024. By July 15, 2024, we had raised \$53,619.56, 95% of our goal. Since then, some parishioners kept giving, others outright gifted the various expenses owed to them back into the fund so that a further amount of \$1,174.48 was leftover and sent on to REST. In summary, \$54,794.04 was raised or 97% of our Goal. Thank you to ALL of you who were able to contribute, either with money or homeware and clothing donations or time served. YOU made this work!



The Rescue Shiba Family project officially ended in October, after the final meeting with Trustees and Wardens at that time. The website has been taken down and the Fund removed from the cathedral donor site. However, some of the core group have maintained contact with the family and have expressed an interest in starting an Education fund for the Shiba family. Three daughters (Latifa, Saheba and Zainab want to get medical worker

qualifications and we know BC is short of nurses – practical and licensed! Young

Mustafa wants to be an airplane pilot. This is a project to be worked on at another time!

THANKS to the core group on the RSF team: the Rev. Margaret Marquardt, Neale Adams, Lorna and Bill Orr, the Rev. Ed Schmitt, the Rev. Kay Schmitt, Jennifer Anger, Nura Mohammed, Kevin Besphlug, Hannah Lupton and others who came when they could. Thank you for the leadership and support provided by the Very Rev. Chris Pappas and the office staff, especially Vanessa Ho and Kathy Irwin. THANK YOU for your service.

Stewardship Committee

Thank you to all who gave their resources to the Cathedral this past year. Your commitment to this place and our programs through gifts of time, talent and money are greatly appreciated.

First a review of our overarching goals:

- Engage Cathedral members and friends in order to deepen their sense of belonging and commitment to the life of the Cathedral by connecting with them "where they are at".
- Provide tailored opportunities for the congregation to plan for, pledge and most easily give of their time, talents and money.
- Build awareness and understanding of the Cathedral's financial needs and need to plan annual budgets.
- Establish a standing Stewardship Committee with on-going plans and key performance metrics.

While we did not start up until late spring, we had big plans with some very positive results. Here we list the various initiatives undertaken along with our decisions and results to date:

- 1. An annual campaign to raise awareness and promote congregational pledging and giving toward the 2025 budget.
 - A 66% increase in the number of people making a pledge with 20+ individuals new to the Cathedral making a pledge.
 - $\circ\quad$ A further 100+ continued with automated giving.

- 2. A campaign to address the \$93K gap in 2024 operational expenses vs revenue through special contributions.
 - Total amount received \$68.8K 74% of goal with contributions from all
 2023 and 2024 trustees and additional generous individuals.
- 3. Special appeals to augment opportunities to make financial gifts.
 - Separated financial appeals from the pastoral letters from the Dean.
 - Opted out of a Thanksgiving appeal as it would conflict with other appeals (Decorations, annual pledge Campaign) and focused on a special year-end appeal.
 - Year-end appeal generated \$12.1K from 27 parishioners bringing us to 86% of the deficit campaign goal.
- 4. Developing opportunities to increase engagement and revenues from the community.
 - o RBC provided volunteers for a day and donated \$5K for Maundy Café.
- 5. Make it easier for visitors to make donations.
 - Introduced the TipTap donation system in the narthex in late August and generated ~\$3K from 318 individual donations.
- 6. Undertake data analysis to better understand giving patterns and opportunities, specifically in relation to on-line giving.
 - Ongoing database clean-up and data analysis providing input to Stewardship activities.
- 7. Understand and recognize the value of our volunteers.
 - Hosted a well-received Wine & Cheese for leaders of ministry groups to thank them for their leadership and introduce them to the annual campaign.
 - Ongoing work to identify the amount of time given by volunteers to the Cathedral.
- 8. Communications to increase awareness and understanding of our resource needs.
 - Wrote updates for the weekly Chronicle newsletter and incorporated the financial situation in the year-end appeal letter.

And a thank you to Helen Williams for bringing forward a poem written by Ellen Clark-King that was used during the last Restoration and Renewal campaign and which we have updated to the here and now. We offer this updated version for use by the Cathedral and look to make it available as a bookmark, hopefully enticing visitors to make a donation.

Over the years Christ Church Cathedral has had and continues to have a marvelous history of people volunteering in different ministries also in supporting the work of the clergy. - baking the cookies and brewing coffee and tea for the gathering following the 10.30am Sunday service.

A volunteer might describe themself as someone who offers their time and effort, especially helping other people, willingly and without payment. The members of this ministry pray however and whenever they choose. There is no "length of term" as in other Cathedral ministries.

Thursday 7:30 AM Eucharist

The Thursday 7:30 a.m. Eucharistic Community has been meeting since the 1970's (more than 50 years!) We are an enthusiastic community (10-25 people) who come together each Thursday morning at 7:30 AM to celebrate the Eucharist and share breakfast afterwards. Weekday Narthex Greeters

Each weekday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. the Cathedral is open for an average of more than 150 visitors who are greeted and welcomed by teams of two volunteers carrying out the Cathedral's ministry of Open Doors, Open Hearts, Open Minds.

These visitors come from near and far. They enter the church for many different reasons; to pray, light a candle, sit quietly in this spiritual space, admire the beauty of the building, ask questions, walk the labyrinth, and, for tourists, to visit one of Vancouver's oldest buildings. Many express their thanks and gratitude for the church being open.

This team of more than 20 volunteers, working in pairs for a 4 hour shift, receives training and is scheduled according to their availability. All who are interested in

Cathedral Choir

For the members of the Cathedral Choir, 2024 was a year filled with emotion: gratitude for our community, joy in making music with Rupert, grief over his departure, anxious anticipation for the future, and honour to support our Cathedral family through song.

We shared many Sunday mornings rich with cultural celebrations, collaborations with amazing musicians, and deeply moving musical performances. Highlights included:

- A celebration of Black History Month featuring the glorious voice of Marcus Mosely
- Singing in Cantonese for Lunar New Year. Hopefully our pronunciation is improving!
- Joining with fiddle and bass in June to feel a bit more Quebecois for St. Jean Baptiste Day
- The Summer Festival in July, including a celebration of the long standing collaboration between Chor Leoni, Elektra, EnChor and the Cathedral Choir with Morna Edmundson conducting
- Exploring the origins and influence of "Ein feste Burg ist unser Gott" in an early music spectacular (complete with sackbuts!) curated by Jacob Gramit and Lucy Smith for Reformation Sunday
- Performing Duruflé's Requiem in the context of Remembrance Sunday service with guest organist David Poon
- Experiencing an entire service of Rupert's compositions under his direction one last time (nicknamed Old Lang Sighs)
- Collaborating with the amazing Vancouver Youth Choir and Carrie Tennant for our Reign of Christ patronal festival

Beyond the morning services, we continued to build the congregation for our evening Compline service, particularly over the summer months. The choir also presented four Evensongs celebrating important occasions in the life of our parish:

• Candlemas and the kickoff of the Cathedral's 135th Anniversary

- March's Lenten Evensong featuring the music of Charles Villiers Stanford and showcasing our magnificent Kenneth Jones pipe organ
- Thanks to advocacy by Byron Hanson and Bruce Hoffman, we sang our first-ever Pride Evensong in the historically accurate month of June. It was a vibrant affair that embraced diversity and inclusion, resonating deeply with many in our community
- St Michael's and All Angels in September

Along with the services, we supported a number of special events throughout 2024 including:

- Hymnfest in May and Carolfest in December. Both events drew people from across the diocese, with Carolfest bringing in almost 200 people to sing Christmas carols together on a Sunday afternoon Perhaps we've started a new holiday tradition?
- the poignant Service of Lament addressing the opioid crisis in April
- Anne Fletcher's play "Duty Calls" where we added our voices from the audience
- The touching tribute to the beloved Herbert O'Driscoll "Come and Journey"

We also honoured several friends, congregants, and members of the wider community at weddings, memorials and funerals throughout the year.

To support the Cathedral's search for a new Director of Music, the choir dedicated three distinct evenings in late May and early June, outside of our regular rehearsals, for the auditions of the shortlisted candidates. Understanding the significance of selecting a new Director who would shape the future of our musical direction, nearly every member of the choir made it a priority to attend and bring their focus and energy to each candidate's audition. A huge thank you to Byron Hanson from the choir and the search committee for handling all of the logistics for these auditions.

Honouring and Celebrating the Music Ministry of Dr. Rupert Lang

In late July, Heather Pynn and Bruce Hoffman met with Rupert to brainstorm ways to mark his departure at the end of the year and honour his 38-year tenure as Director of Music. Together, they planned a series of events involving the choir, choir alumni, and congregation, culminating in **Voices of Gratitude** on December 15th, the traditional Joy Sunday of Advent.

In October, we revived the choir's traditional Thanksgiving dinner, which includes singing Compline before sharing dessert.

Knowing that the list of music Rupert wanted to conduct "one more time" exceeded the remaining Sundays, we organised **Sing the Bucket List** in November. The invitation went out to current singers and alumni resulting in nearly 40 people singing over 20 favourite pieces from both Rupert's and the choristers' lists. Supported by pianists Stephen Smith and Eric Hominick, we made a mighty sound together and enjoyed connecting with friends over a pizza dinner afterwards.

During Rupert's final Advent season with us, chorister and historian Stephen Wright presented a fascinating 40-Minute Forum on the history of music at Christ Church, neatly highlighting Rupert's longevity – 38 years! – as Director of Music.

Rupert's departure was featured in two consecutive episodes of CBC's North x Northwest, and on December 15th, Voices of Gratitude was "sold out." When one person attempted to scalp tickets on the North x Northwest Facebook page, we had to gently point out that the event was, in fact, free. Thanks to the donation of wine from the Seaforth Regiment, we could truly toast Rupert's accomplishments and wish him well.

Described by M.C. Alisdair Smith as a "sing-along kitchen party," Voices of Gratitude included heartfelt speeches, stellar musical arrangements by Jacob Gramit – including an incredible medley of Rupert's compositions – and guest musicians, featuring regimental pipes and drums, some of Vancouver's top studio musicians, including members of the rock group Trooper, and keyboard wizards Peter Allen and Bryn Nixon. The evening culminated in the presentation of the Canadian Music Centre's Barbara Pentland Award for Musical Excellence in recognition of Rupert's extraordinary contributions to Canadian music. Huge thanks go to the Cathedral's admin team and building staff, as well as the army of volunteers that helped!

Our final Thursday rehearsal with Rupert on December 19th was followed by social time and the presentation of gifts from the choir, including a beautifully curated photobook and a Kudoboard full of greetings from choristers and friends world-wide. On Advent IV, after the presentation of gifts from the congregation, the congregation and choir sang 690 on Burrard with words crafted by Ivor Mickelson, Heather, and Bruce to honour Rupert.

The year 2024 was a remarkable chapter for Christ Church Cathedral Choir, marked by poignant farewells and joyous celebrations. We reflected on 135 years of rich history and celebrated the transformative contributions of Dr. Rupert Lang as Director of Music.

The choir's commitment to excellence and community shone through events like the Service of Lament, Pride Evensong, and Voices of Gratitude. As we bid farewell to a year of endings and new beginnings, we look forward to 2025 with hope and enthusiasm. Welcoming Dr. Neil Cockburn, we aim to build on the strong foundation laid by our predecessors. With unity and optimism, we are ready to create more beautiful music and cherished memories.

The Maundy Café

The Maundy Café is the Cathedral's food outreach ministry, serving people experiencing food insecurity. We serve freshly cooked, balanced meals on Mondays, Thursdays, and Fridays.

In 2024 we served 16,620 meals. Our total costs were \$62,260. The cost all in per meal was \$2.96.

Maundy Café continues to receive support from the Greater Vancouver Food Bank which enables us to keep costs lower. We are aware that the food bank has had, like many charities, an increase in demand and fewer donations which may impact our costs for 2025. We receive their support because we are a service using food to feed people in need.

Our volunteers, along with the Café's manager Lane Wyness, are the backbone of our service.

We have approximately 55 volunteers serving on 2 different shifts each meal day. An early shift of three volunteers works preparing the meals and another 8-10 serve the food to our guests. We are also blessed with three volunteer piano players. Maundy Café has also benefited from the pastoral support of the Rev. Christian Okeke.

Endowment Fund Administrators

2024 was a good year of returns for the Endowment Funds, coming off a difficult 2023 year when many needed grants could not be made. For the Funds held in the Diocesan Investment Fund (CTF) the Administrators increased the reserves to preserve buying power and to cover for difficult years. In 2024 the Administrators made grants to Parish Ministry, Maundy Café, totaling \$64,000, and conditionally up to \$92,000 if needed. They also held over to 2025 a grant for new Choir albs. For 2025, the Administrators are committed to exploring in detail the financial implications and prudence of a call for divestment from fossil fuel investments and will make recommendations to Trustees.

Pastoral Care

The Pastoral Care team is overseen by Vicar Areeta. With a team of 12 people that meets once a month, a schedule is developed for teams of two lay parishioners to visit shut-ins in the home, in hospital, and those in care. The lay ministers are commissioned at the end of the Sunday 10:30 a.m. Eucharist to carry the sacrament to parishioners.

The travelling communion kits are prepared by the servers and altar guild. When visiting with parishioners we chat, and share what events are happening at the Cathedral. In preparation for the Eucharist, we often ask if the parishioner has a favourite scripture which we can read during the service and invite them to participate as they are able. Sharing the Eucharist in a small setting with a few people can be a blessed and sacred experience for the parishioner and the visitors.

Pastoral visits are important for several reasons: They help shut-in parishioners feel that they are still part of the Cathedral community, even if they can't be there physically. These visits bring comfort to many who are lonely and isolated. Eucharist in a parishioner's own home affirms that when two or three are gathered, God is there with them.

An additional ministry of Pastoral Care is writing to shut-ins monthly and on special occasions, like birthdays when we know the date. Handwritten letters and cards brighten up their day. Most letters and cards go directly to the parishioner; others are mailed to family members who bring them and read them to their loved ones.

Alongside Hope (Primate's World Relief and Development Fund)

PWRDF has a new name: Alongside Hope: Anglican and partners working for change in Canada and around the world

The Parish PWRDF Working Group consists of Mark Halyk (Parish Coordinator), Lauren Odile Pinkney, Susanne Cruickshank, Pamela Mehmi, and myself (I am also on the Diocese of New Westminster PWRDF Unit).

In 2023, the Working Group organized a dinner on Nov. 4/2023 at the Cathedral focusing on the "Communicarte Colombian" PWRDF, an ecological partnership regarding the Paramos (Moorlands), training young people and members of the community in communications to inform and empower farmers and the wider community of the ecological issues of the area and the importance of water protection. A local Colombian business founded by a refugee family: *Colombian Antojitos*, catered, and Mark a "chef of renown" added his own touch, along with the artistic touches of Pamela and Lauren. The dinner raised over \$2000.00. This partnership continues and more information can be found on the Alongside Hope website.

PWRDF Christmas cards: the donor receives a pack of cards (12) and a tax receipt for a \$25.00 donation. Thank you to all parishioners who regularly contribute to

PWRDF/Alongside Hope through the Cathedral and directly through the website. A monthly letter is sent from PWRDF/Alongside Hope monthly to anyone signing up.

The Diocese of New Westminster's PWRDF/Alongside Hope Unit has an annual meeting for parish reps. from around the diocese to give support and the Unit members are available. PWRDF annual Ride for Refuge is especially supported by CCC parishioner Jane Dittrich. Thank you, Jane. At this time, the Cathedral doesn't have a parish representative. It's a creative ministry and is a profound way to be part of engaging in justice and peace work together with others around the world. Alongside Hope works in partnerships around the world and only goes where we are invited. Empowering the local community towards systemic long-term change in resiliency is the main goal and also in collaborating closely with other partners on the ground. 
Healing Prayer Ministry

Dean's Council for Diversity and Multiculturalism

In 2024, the Dean's Council for Diversity and Multiculturalism excitedly championed cultural awareness and inclusivity through an incredible array of events and engaging initiatives. This journey truly showcased the Cathedral's heartfelt commitment to recognizing, learning from, and honouring diverse heritages. Moreover, it created a welcoming space to embrace and elevate the presence of all cultures, especially those often overlooked, alongside the cherished Anglican traditions rooted in European heritage.

Notable examples of this mission included the launch of the <u>CCC Cultural Tea Bar</u>, two significant church-wide celebrations—<u>Africa Day on May 26</u> and the <u>Latin</u> <u>American Liberation</u>, <u>Love & Friendship Day on September 29</u>—and the introduction of <u>"Stories: Migration + Placedness" in the Chronicle</u>.

The CCC Cultural Tea Bar, launched in March 2024, hosted five events last year, each attracting approximately 100 to 110 participants. Each gathering centred on a distinct culture, providing an immersive experience with organic teas and refreshments that reflect environmental, cultural, and economic sustainability. The food gifted by the land beautifully reminds us of the divine blessings that nourish us both physically and spiritually since Creation, as generations of God's children have experienced. It serves as a lovely metaphor, connecting cultures and people with every sip and bite. This invitation to community allows us to explore our rich and diverse heritage, reflecting on the land that sustains us. Through this shared experience, we embrace kinship with those who differ from us, nurtured by cultural curiosity and discovery.

- A Taste of Russia (December 29, 2024)
- A Taste of Mexico (Feb 16, 2025)

In conjunction with the above events, the Dean's Council of Diversity and Multiculturalism has gently introduced the <u>"Stories: Migration + Placedness"</u> series within the Cathedral's Chronicle, narrating the interplay of personal migration experiences, cultural identity, human longings, and faith journeys among several parishioners. One of the potential initiatives for year 2025:

(Tentative) A visionary proposal for fostering broader parish (or diocese) engagement: "Our People. Our Food Table."—a unique e-story and cookbook (with options for printed copies) that honours the rich tapestry of culinary traditions among our Cathedral's parish members. This initiative is deeply rooted in the exploration of personal histories, ancestral memories, and diverse cultures, inviting contributors to share not only their cherished recipes but also the poignant stories behind their heritage. We seek to cultivate a greater sense of community, inclusivity, and theological reflection by weaving together narratives of celebration and connections through cultural dishes and beverages. This concept will be further considered and developed at any forthcoming Dean's Council of Diversity and Multiculturalism meeting, where its implementation and potential impact will be examined in greater detail.

Proofreaders

Given that a report on bulletin proofreading (checking for grammatical, spelling, and formatting errors) would not be particularly useful nor exciting reading, I will instead comment on how the process of bulletin preparation changed in 2024. At the beginning of the year the cathedral had just undergone an administrative reorganization and the bulletin was being produced in Word by the Rev. Adam Dawkins. This was not ideal in terms of formatting; the decision was made to switch

to InDesign, a program specifically intended for page layout and publishing, which we previously used at the cathedral a number of years ago. The learning curve was quite steep, but with training from Ben Dobyns, our Administrative Assistant Diogo Portela now efficiently takes a template document produced in Google Docs and converts it into the finished bulletin we receive on a Sunday morning. The result may not yet have reached perfection (nothing short of heaven does), but we strive toward that goal and hopefully the congregation will have noted improvements in the quality of the bulletin compared to a few years ago.

We participated in morning worship in the outdoor chapel, booked the "Cathedral Week" dates for 2025 (July 20-26) as well as securing the Rev. Canon Dr. Harold Munn as one of the course leaders for that week. Dean Chris and I both also attended Sorrento Centre's Thanksgiving Associates Weekend.

Digital Initiatives Report

Summary

In January 2024, Dean Chris contracted me to help develop a digital community-building plan for Christ Church Cathedral. Working closely with Cathedral staff—particularly Clare Morgan—I developed, secured approval for, and piloted multiple initiatives over the course of the year. This report outlines our development timeline, pilot program outcomes, and guiding principles, then offers a vision for sustainable growth in 2025 and beyond. By innovating ways to connect with underserved communities, we aim to embody the Cathedral's commitment to inclusive ministry and fellowship.

Development - Spring 2024

We began by formalizing a design philosophy for digital and hybrid community engagement.

Identify underserved needs within the Cathedral and adjacent communities.

Design events that meet those needs with a low barrier to entry.

Attract potential community leaders who could maintain high levels of engagement.

Maintain continuity through an ongoing digital communications platform.

By focusing on small projects with a large impact, we would find individuals who could help us create a healthy core community culture, who would then be positioned to model that culture and excitement for new members as we grew.

After much brainstorming, we settled on proposing and piloting the following programs:

Drag Communion – An ecumenical partnership with several local churches and organizations

Sanctuary Dungeons & Dragons – An ecumenical partnership with Shaughnessy Heights United Church

SQUID Discord server – A hub for regional spiritual and queer community

Approval - Spring 2024

After developing our community-building strategy, Clare and I presented it to the Board of Trustees, who approved our key digital initiatives with enthusiasm. We especially appreciated the Board's nuanced understanding that by creating spaces specifically for marginalized groups, we fulfill the broader Christian call to love one another inclusively. Rather than excluding anyone, these programs intentionally invite and include people who have historically been left out.

Pilot Programs - Fall 2024

Rooted in the Cathedral's tradition of compassionate ministry, these pilot programs embody longstanding Christian values of radical hospitality. Our goal is not to replace core doctrines but to broaden the Cathedral's ministry by inviting people who often feel left out. The following are highlights from our Fall 2024 pilot phase.

Drag Communion

Held at Shaughnessy Heights United Church on World Communion Day in October of 2024, this service featured ministry participants from the Cathedral and Shaughnessy Heights, as well as the Cathedral's Byron Hanson in his drag debut, along with three other drag liturgists, a 30-member choir, and an army of volunteers.

The sanctuary was packed with attendees, many of whom hadn't attended church in years. A large contingent of St Brigids members also attended, helping to set healthy community norms. A common quote heard from attendees was "If church were like this all the time, I'd be back every week." It was a deeply moving service that provided spiritual healing for numerous attendees, who spoke eloquently afterwards about how profoundly it affected them to have the sacredness of queer people centered in a Sunday morning service.

In addition to the physical participants, the online stream was viewed over 600 times and has attracted both national and international attention from leaders in queer spirituality movements. Churches in Montreal, Toronto, Idaho, and beyond have requested copies of the liturgy and educational materials created for the event to host Drag Communions of their own.

In preparation for the event, the hosting congregation saw an uptick in volunteers and an enriched sense of collective purpose. This demonstrates that ministry events centering marginalized people can not only meet specific pastoral needs but also invigorate the entire worship community.

Multiple local churches have also asked to host a Drag Communion from our team. The next Drag Communion is currently scheduled for April 27, 2025.

Takeaways

By identifying a desire for spiritual connection among queer people who have been hurt by the church, creating an event with a name that instantly communicated to the target community that this event was centering them, and following through with a thoughtfully designed liturgy, we made getting the word out easy and drew a large crowd that is eager for the next Drag Communion.

The hosting church, which spent four months in advance of the service holding educational events for members to prepare for the service, experienced firsthand the power of serving other people's needs in their space, rather than trying to attract more members to serve the church's internal needs.

The practical outcomes, as well as the deeply meaningful spiritual experiences that occurred within Drag Communion, have already led to new members and greater volunteerism within the hosting church.

Sanctuary Dungeons & Dragons

Launched in September of 2024, the Sanctuary D&D pilot featured a storyline that emphasized moral decision making and ethical heroism within a world inspired by Greek myth. With gamemasters from the Cathedral and from Shaughnessy Heights, and players from not only those church communities but the broader Vancouver area, participants created bonds and friendships in the context of the Cathedral's sacred spaces.

Overall, thirty-six players participated in these ongoing sessions between September and December, far in excess of the ten players we had planned for. Thanks to volunteer gamemasters stepping up, we were able to meet much of that need.

Takeaways

Because we know that Dungeons & Dragons has become immensely popular, and that many would-be players struggle to find games, we expected this pilot program would attract enough people to make it viable. We did not expect that we would have to close registration due to our volunteer team's capacity limits. These events have significant growth potential. Of particular note is that the ongoing nature of the storyline keeps people coming back into the Cathedral's space over and over again, where they are able to feel welcomed, comfortable, and that they are making genuine connections. Community is built through ongoing exposure to the same people and places, which is what this program is designed to do.

While not explicitly spiritual, the events clearly changed the perception of the church among many attendees, who were surprised and relieved by the warm welcome that they received by Cathedral staff.

SQUID Discord Server

This community hub is the core element of our pilot program strategy. By organizing events and managing communication through this server, we create digital

continuity between physical events, allowing new connections and communities to stay in touch.

SQUID, while set up to meet the needs of people seeking queer spirituality connections and support in the lower mainland, has also grown and exceeded expectations in surprising ways. With sixty-five members already—again a higher number than we expected for our pilot programs—its core mission of providing a place for queer spiritual connection has clearly met a significant regional need.

Most significantly, Pacific Mountain Region Affirming Ministries (which serves BC and the Yukon for the United Church) is adopting SQUID as their online home for community and communication, with an onboarding training session set for them on January 22, 2025.

Numerous attendees from Drag Communion have also joined SQUID, as have the Sanctuary D&D players. The Cathedral's St Brigids community has gathered there as well, in a space designed to build connections and showcase the Cathedral's work serving the LGBQT community.

Takeaways

SQUID has grown faster than expected and clearly is meeting needs for various queer spiritual communities that have been unable to connect with each other in the past. By building larger regional networks and connections, we're positioned to help queer people seeking community find churches across BC and the Yukon where they will be accepted enthusiastically as who they are.

The more that SQUID can serve as a digital comms component of real-world events, the more it will grow.

Design Philosophy

Before moving on to proposals and needs for 2025, I'd like to share an updated version of our approach to building digital communities, based on the lessons learned from our pilot programs.

Our design philosophy centers on visible inclusion, respectful engagement, and shared leadership. When attendees see marginalized voices in leadership, trust and authenticity follow. Clear guidelines for respectful dialogue foster openness without alienating those who have felt unwelcome in the past. These principles guide every event and online platform we create.

Our goal is to ensure that all individuals feel welcomed and valued—especially those who have historically experienced exclusion or harm in faith-based settings. When we make our commitment to inclusion visible, we not only reassure specific marginalized groups of their welcome but also affirm to the wider community that these values apply to everyone. A sense of belonging is critical for every member, regardless of background.

Strong, healthy communities rely on leaders—both employees and community members—who prioritize the safety and dignity of all. They also depend on clear, actionable plans to address harmful behaviors. Without these safeguards, marginalized or vulnerable members may withdraw entirely, weakening the broader community and exacerbating divisions over time.

When people feel genuinely valued, they are more inclined to contribute their gifts and perspectives. Supporting marginalized groups enriches the community with diverse ideas, creativity, and active involvement.

Similarly, spaces like SQUID—the Cathedral's Discord server—are crucial for those who often face discrimination in larger contexts. Although SQUID was created with the safety of marginalized groups in mind, it also welcomes people from all backgrounds, avoiding an explicitly exclusive approach. This balance of prioritizing vulnerable members while remaining open to everyone builds a healthy, resilient church environment.

Our ongoing strategy is to encourage broad participation in all communal settings. Each service or space reflects different identities and needs, and understanding these nuances helps us better serve the entire Cathedral community.

By applying these principles to our next phases of growth, we can both create targeted events that serve targeted underserved needs, while also contributing more broadly to the diverse and vibrant life of the Cathedral.

Growth Opportunities

In the fall and winter of 2024, our ability to grow and meet demand quickly reached volunteer capacity limits. It was clear that, while the ideas that Clare and I developed were working, we would need a plan to increase our capacity and resources to both meet those existing needs and to grow into serving other underserved communities.

Moving forward, we have identified the following growth opportunities:

• Existing Programs

- Sanctuary D&D We anticipate this could grow into at least 100 members, most under the age of 40.
- Drag Communion So many local churches want to host this service that we could be out every month in a new church and still not meet demand.
- SQUID This is growing faster than we expected. It's the strategic glue that maintains connections between events.
- **New Proposed Programs** (all with an online component)
 - Battle of the Organs (partnership with RCCO and other area churches)
 In-person and online interactive concerts designed to attract younger audiences
 - Theme-Focused Half-day Retreats (example: Queering the Bible) By designing themes intended to resonate with underserved communities and identities, we can bring more people into the Cathedral and create connections across particular identities
 - Sanctuary Board Game Nights all-ages events to help introduce families to the Cathedral as a welcoming space

We have a dozen more ideas, but these three appear most likely to help grow our physical and online communities across a broader range of needs and identities.

In addition to these concepts, there are also specific digital outreach initiatives that we can begin as our online community begins to reach large enough numbers to drive ongoing and active engagement, including Instagram livestreams, TikToks, more YouTube content, and beyond. Then, rather than dropping digital content into an ocean and watching it disappear, we'll have a digital community there to engage with and amplify our creations.

Growth at this stage requires labor, which is a challenge during our temporary budget shortfall. While we can likely continue with existing initiatives on a volunteer basis, we'll need help in order to grow.

I recognize concerns about investing in new initiatives during a budget shortfall. However, by focusing on sustainable expansion—using volunteer leadership, pursuing grants, and scaling up only when capacity allows—we ensure these programs maintain continuity responsibly.

I have begun identifying grants that could help cover our labor costs during the shortfall period. It may also be that it's best at this stage to continue in our Pilot phase for the spring/summer of 2025, until more financial or labor resources can be devoted to supporting a growth phase.

I recommend budgeting now for effective ways to commit resources to community growth once the budget shortfall has ended, including dedicated labor hours, event budgets, and organizational support. That will position us to move quickly on leveraging our pilot program metrics and outcomes into broader growth when time and resources permit.
